Welcome to Dust on the Page: Narratives of the Southwest! This course explores the unique confluence of cultures, landscapes, and imaginations that have defined New Mexico as both a real and symbolic space in literature and art. From Indigenous storytelling traditions to modernist experiments in fiction and photography, New Mexico has long drawn artists, writers, and visionaries seeking clarity, inspiration, or reinvention under its vast skies.

We'll read works by authors such as D. H. Lawrence, Leslie Marmon Silko, and Willa Cather, whose writings reflect the region's complex histories and mythologies. But we'll also pay close attention to visual artists—like Georgia O'Keeffe and Ansel Adams—who helped shape the cultural imaginary of the Southwest. Literature will be our foundation, but we'll consider how words and images work together to define place, memory, identity, and belonging. New Mexico is often called the "Land of Enchantment," but enchantment can be both luminous and unsettling.

This course will ask: Who tells the stories of this land? Who is seen, and who is erased? What draws people to New Mexico, and what do they find—or fail to find—when they arrive? Bring your curiosity, your willingness to look and listen carefully, and your readiness to think across genres and disciplines.

I look forward to exploring this rich and layered landscape with you.
